# Women Lead Political Reform in Fureidis

Less than a year after the start of the social empowerment project in Fureidis, the village women have already made history.

When the program opened last January, few of the participants could name a goal for themselves. Eleven months later, five have jobs, several are exploring opportunities for higher education, three are studying for their matriculation exams, and seven have completed their first year of Hebrew lessons – significant first steps towards active engagement in Israeli society.

In November, the women turned their attention to even larger matters. In anticipation of a mayoral election – and emboldened by their own newfound freedom - the women invited all five mayoral candidates to a public forum to speak about women's issues. Three hundred women turned out. In a town where women have up until now remained largely

invisible, this event was groundbreaking. The women went on to spearhead a successful grassroots campaign in support of one of the candidates.

Mayor Yunis recognizes the role played by the women of Fureidis in his election. He has gone on record promising to set up a Women's Division in the municipal government, with a budget and a paid director. The Fureidis Women's Division will be the first in an Israeli Arab municipality and only the second in all of Israel. The women plan to remain active in advising the new administration on a variety of local projects.

Women Reborn owes much of its success to a unique alliance between the religious Muslim women of Fureidis, led by Ibtisam Mahameed, and the Israeli feminist community. The program has already been recognized as a successful model. The Director of Givat Haviva, a well-established Arab-Israeli peace center at a local Arab college, states that "Ibtisam's program has had a far greater

impact than any of the other women's empowerment activities we've been involved with. We are hoping to help replicate it in other Arab towns and villages in our region."

#### CRT Highlights

## Sarasota Women's Interfaith Network Builds Tolerance

The Women's Interfaith Network (WIN) of Sarasota-Bradenton completed its first year of local organizing in December. Inspired by Elana Rozenman's work in Israel and Palestine, the group brings together women of different faiths to build tolerance, create public conversations about peacemaking, conduct interfaith service projects, and fight against religious discrimination. Currently there are over 80 members representing Judaism, several forms of Christianity, Islam, Quakerism, Buddhism and Humanism as well as indigenous and spiritual traditions.

During 2008, WIN actively engaged in combating religious intolerance in Sarasota and Bradenton in response to the promotion of an anti-Islamic DVD. In September WIN held an interfaith food drive in conjunction with the UN International Day of Peace. Almost 1400 pounds of food was gathered by 26 different faith communities for the All Faiths Food Bank. The food bank director was tremendously moved: "This is the first time in my memory that different religions have joined together to collect food for the hungry in Sarasota. Its amazing what women can do when they work together across boundaries."

### Abrahamic Reunion Plans for 2009

In June, the *Abrahamic Reunion* held its third annual retreat in



Zichron Zaachov, Israel. The group renewed friendships, reviewed accomplishments and begin planning for 2009. Local community interfaith dinners and walks for peace will continue, as will AR participation in larger events, such as the *Big Hug around Jerusalem* and the annual *Sulha* gathering.

In addition AR will expand their capacity to respond to humanitarian needs from an interfaith perspective. This work began in 2008 with the development of an interfaith emergency relief program funded by the Oberle foundation in Germany. Funds have been distributed to both Israelis and Palestinians in need, including residents of Sderot affected by ongoing rocket attacks and Palestinians in need of medical supplies and attention.
